



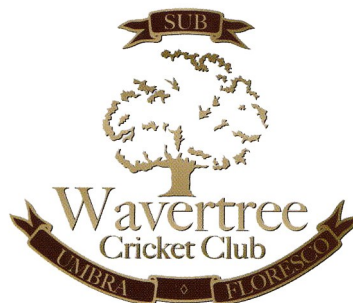

MELLY FOUNTAIN—NEW PLAQUE PROPOSED



Tucked quietly away beside the Picton Road railway bridge is this 165 year old granite drinking fountain. It has a fascinating history which the Wavertree Society plan to mark with a green heritage plaque this year.

Liverpool businessman Charles Melly had the idea of installing drinking water fountains across the city after a visit to Geneva in 1852.

He put the first on Princes dock where he noticed that dockers, sailors & local people had only water from horse troughs or cheap beer to quench their thirst.

Melly installed 40 fountains each made from high quality Aberdeenshire red granite and sculpted by the MacDonald company who also fashioned the Trafalgar Square lions and tombs of Albert and Victoria.

Our Picton Road fountain has survived in remarkably good condition, one of only 9 remaining. Sadly Melly, who also campaigned for 'wayside benches' and was one of those behind the creation of Sefton Park, suffered poor mental health and took his own life aged only 59.

Next time you are passing stop and take a closer look at this important reminder of those times when clean drinking water was not readily available to everyone and of the man who made it his mission to put right that injustice.

Thanks to committee member Adrian Servoir for nominating the fountain and writing this article.

WAVERTREE GARDEN SUBURB NEWS

Wavertree Garden Suburb in Bloom 2025

A dedicated group of people/gardeners continues to meet every Sunday morning from 10 -12 at the Institute on Thingwall Road to do whatever jobs need doing in the garden there. We make planters, take cuttings, plan open days, plants sales etc. Anyone is welcome to come along and see if it is something they might be interested in

We have managed to make, install and plant up 9 planters and volunteers have made sure they have been watered adequately and plants have been replaced if necessary.

During the year we were presented with a plaque by the National Garden Open Scheme which was attached to a summer house funded by a grant from them. We also received a donation from a kind anonymous donor and we used that to fund another planter which is in situ in the garden along with several others funded by the group.

We have been pressing the council for the replacement of trees firstly along Thingwall Road and then we will work on other roads in the suburb. Many have been lost over the years mainly because of age but also because of disease and damage. This is after all, a Garden Suburb and most of it is part of a Conservation Area. A few trees had been planted in Southway, but nothing seemed to be happening elsewhere. We were then lucky enough that our councillor Julie Fadden offered to fund 6 for us on Thingwall Road, followed by the council funding 6 more and then we, the Wavertree Garden Suburb in Bloom group were able to fund 2 from the profits from our plant sales. There is still a way to go but we are happy that at least, some of the gaps have been filled and hope to do more in the future. It was disappointing that one of the residents on Thingwall Road dissuaded the council employees from putting a tree on the verge in front of their house because of "leaves". Maybe next time we'll remedy that.

The Institute has been looking festive this Christmas thanks to the Christmas tree our councillor Julie has provided from her Neighbourhood Fund and the lighting and decorations which have been provided by our group of volunteers.

Over the following year we aim to install several more planters on Thingwall Road. Volunteers to water any during dry spells would be greatly appreciated. These will be funded with the profits from our upcoming events, an Open Day on 28th February and a larger Plant Sale on 25th July, both at the Institute from 11.00 until 3.00.
